# Wind storm latest wild weather

# Hydro working to restore power to 190,000 last night

Strong winds gusting up to 90 km/h left more than 80,000 people without power across the Lower Mainland yester-

Power lines were downed, trees fell and the Stanley Park Causeway and Stanley Park Drive were closed for several hours, which meant the Lions Gate Bridge was also closed.

Lights were also out at many Lower Mainland intersections, causing traffic

B.C. Hydro spokeswoman Elisha Moreno said the severity of the storm caught the utility by surprise.

"We didn't expect the winds to be as strong. We have seen gusts of 90 km/h, and that's throwing some

branches and trees around. and causing some extensive outages."

B.C. Hydro had all available crews and contract staff working through the day and night. Additional staff was being brought in from the Interior to help.

Moreno added that most customers without power were in Surrey and that some problems had to be assessed overnight before problems

could be fixed. She said power wouldn't be restored to some customers until at least this morning.

Across the B.C. South Coast, in all, 190,000 were without power last night.

On Vancouver Island, Port Alberni resident Susan Jones said the town is being swept by hurricane-force winds that have knocked out most power.
